Departmental (English) Honors vs. College (Latin) Honors

Below, see an outline of how Departmental (English) Honors figure into the calculation of College (Latin) Honors. This outline was produced by the Classics department in January 2024. For the definitive and most up-to-date account of these guidelines, students should consult the Harvard College Student Handbook.

Departmental Honors Recommendations (English Honors): "No Honors," "Honors," "High Honors," or "Highest Honors" recommended by the student's department. English honors appear on the student's transcript, but not on the degree, with the exception of students awarded Highest Honors but not a *summa* degree: these students are awarded a diploma "*magna cum laude* with highest honors in field."

College (Latin) Honors: "Honors," "High Honors," and "Highest Honors" are converted by the Registrar as follows:
